Course Description:

Honors 101 is to help introduce Honors students to The University of Tampa's Honors Program. The goal of UT's Honors Program is to provide our brightest students a more intellectually engaging and meaningful college experience. To accomplish this, Honors 101 is designed to prepare students to become scholars and intellectuals. This particular section of HON 101 is designed to introduce students to the academic study of language, culture and medicine. This course is designed to prepare students to be culturally literate and to develop cultural awareness by conducting a research project on the intersection of language, culture and medicine.

Learning Outcomes and Course Objectives:

The fundamental goal of this course is to help you make your college experience more meaningful and successful, as well as to integrate you into the UT community. By the end of this course, students will be able to:

I. College Transition:

- 1. Describe the culture of UT
- 2. Know the difference between high school and college academic standards
- 3. Identify and use higher education resources
- 4. Increase competency in higher education skills including completion of an academic or professional plan
- 5. Explain the factors that affect undergraduate degree completion

II. Time Management:

- 1. Identify effective time management strategies
- 2. Explain the advantages and disadvantages of various time management tools
- 3. Apply your understanding of time management planning tools to various situations
- 4. Understand the importance of prioritization.

III. Critical Thinking:

- 1. Develop the ability to consider information from different viewpoints
- 2. Set goals to improve your critical thinking skills and evaluate information using these skills, including the ability to analyze assumptions and biased information
- 3. Move toward empathetic thinking

IV. Inquiry:

- 1. Find reliable, academic sources
- 2. Write a research question
- 3. Synthesize research across sources in a literature review
- 4. Delineate a methodology for a research study
- 5. Create instruments to be used in a research study
- 6. Give a proposal presentation on the intended research study
- 7. Complete an IRB proposal
- 8. Discover how to be involved in research and creative activity at UT

ATTENDANCE

Each day of class attendance will count as 10 points towards each student's attendance grade. It is understood, however, that students may experience difficulties beyond their control that result in the inability to attend class. For this reason, a student may miss one (1) class period for any reason (e.g. illness, funerals, personal issues, family trips, jury duty, employment commitments, etc.) without their attendance grade being penalized. *Tardiness*: Students must be physically present in the classroom for the entire class period each day to receive full attendance credit. Any day a student arrives late or leaves early, the professor will mark them tardy and their daily attendance grade will be lowered by a minimum of 5 points. Students should not make a habit of arriving late/departing early because it will always have a negative effect on their grade. Two tardies will convert into one (1) absence.

University-related absences: If a student participates in an officially sanctioned university extracurricular activity (e.g. as a member of athletic, academic, or other extracurricular teams) and they will miss class because of their involvement in those activities, they must provide written documentation on official letterhead to their professor at the beginning of the semester. Absences for university functions will not count against the allowed absences.

Religious holidays: Religiously observant students wishing to be absent on holidays that require missing class should notify their professor in writing at the beginning of the semester. Absences for religious holidays will not count against the allowed absences.

Excessive absences: For every absence beyond the original allowed absences, a student's final grade will be reduced by five (5) percentage points. For example, if a student misses two classes, their final grade will be reduced five (5) percentage points (e.g. from a 93 to an 88, from an 82 to a 77, etc.), whereas three absences will be a reduction of 10 points (e.g. from a 93 to an 83, from an 82 to a 72, etc.), and so on.

PARTICIPATION

Active participation is fundamental to a student's success in university courses. Each week throughout the semester, students will receive a participation grade worth 10 points towards their final grade. The grade a student receives will be based on consistent participation during class that day.

No makeup participation: There is no way to make up participation. No participation components can be completed if absent from class.

Electronic devices: Please note that any sort of electronic device during class time without first asking the professor for permission is not allowed. Please store all electronic devices out of sight until class has been dismissed. The use of such devices without permission is disrespectful and will affect the participation grade.

RESEARCH PROJECT

This section of HON 101 is a special research section. Assignments for the research project will build throughout the semester and will continue in the spring semester. By the end of HON 101, you will have written a series of small sections that will conclude in a short research proposal

presentation and an IRB submission. This research project will continue in the spring semester where you will actually conduct your research.


Advising

All first-year students are assigned an academic advisor through the Academic Advising Office. I will serve as your first-year academic instructor.

Grading

Grades in the First-Year Experience Seminar are awarded under the A-F grading system. Please note that BAC/HON courses may only be retaken the semester immediately following the failure. Students cannot withdraw from BAC 101 for any reason.

Below is a chart outlining the course sequence for students to successfully complete their BAC course requirement.



The catalog states, "If a student does not successfully complete the <u>BAC 101/BAC 102</u> or <u>HON 101/HON-102</u> sequence, they must retake the course the following semester. Each course in the sequence can only be retaken once, and therefore must be completed in the first three semesters. If the course is failed twice, the student will not continue in the sequence and will complete ASK 100: Academic Skills. If the student already completed ASK 100, the course for completion will be determined by the Director of the First-Year Experience Program."

Please be aware that the university allows only three courses to be retaken for grade forgiveness. Consider this before you use one of these attempts in a 1-credit course. If you wish to take this course for grade forgiveness, please follow the procedure in the catalog under

Repeating Courses/Grade Forgiveness Policy. You must submit your grade forgiveness before graduation.

Please note that all students must all complete BAC 100: Baccalaureate Digital Skills with a Satisfactory (S) grade in addition to the First-Year Seminar requirement.

REPORTING SEXUAL VIOLENCE/ TITLE IX MATTERS
